myself a Cancer Survivor! But I can say with pride, I prevented my own Colon Cancer! It's more than wearing the shirt or the pin, its having the casual conversation about family history. On that day, my mother said she was my age when she had problems

with her colon. I take after my mother in many ways, and I feared this would be no different.

I immediately called my doctor and got an appointment for my colonoscopy within weeks. I was shocked at how effortless the procedure was. As I was waking up, I heard the doctor speaking to my husband and learned I am my mother's daughter. My eyes were locked on Chris' as this smile came across his face. The doctor proudly explained to him how invaluable my screening was to our family. A polyp was removed that was blocking my colon almost 50%. The doctor was quite specific in his comments that my life would have been drastically different had I waited.

I felt so empowered. I changed the course of my life. C.A.S.U.A.L. Day 2009 gave me the chance to continue to be the mother I was born to be, the wife my husband deserves, and most importantly, it gave me the opportunity to remind everyone involved in this great event the most important thing: Colon Cancer Awareness really does save unlimited adult lives!
