Judie Brier - Story of Survivorship

Just to be able to say I am a 36 year survivor of ovarian cancer fills me with gratitude and hope for others.

I noticed a lump in my abdomen. It continued to grow very rapidly and I quickly scheduled an appointment with my doctor. Concerned about the growth, my doctor immediately scheduled surgery to remove the cyst after my examination. Twenty doctors were in the operating room for the surgery, where they found that my cyst was the size of a volleyball. They were able to remove the cyst but they also found a teratoma containing hair, teeth and a brain on my ovary. I learned that teratomas are extremely rare and my case was recorded as medical history at Philadelphia Hospital. Doctors had to perform a total hysterectomy. Following surgery my prognosis was very poor.

My mom sent my name to St. Jude (my namesake) and I thankfully beat the odds. I appreciate each day that is given to me as a special gift from God.

I also feel very blessed to have a beautiful family. Melissa, my daughter, was young at the time of the surgery. I also have two granddaughters who

Breast Cancer Program Targeted to Women over 60

A cross the nation and the Commonwealth women are being screened for breast cancer in ever decreasing numbers. In northeastern Pennsylvania, not only is the prevalence of screening decreasing over time, but the percentage of women screened has been lower than the state average for some time.

Free Breast Cancer: What I Need to Know programs are being offered by the Northeast Regional Cancer Institute to encourage women over 60 to follow recommended breast cancer screening standards. The program will address risk


factors of breast cancer, the importance of routine screening/early detection in successful treatment, and individualized information on screening sites, payment assistance, and access to transportation.
