

Georgette Mecca - Story of Survivorship

was so honored when I was asked to co-chair this year's Cancer Survivor Celebration. My journey and battle with cancer started in 2002, with a routine mammogram. A small lump was found in my left breast, so small that I did not detect it.

I took immediate action and made an appointment with a local surgeon, who turned out to be a friend and important part of my support team.

Dr. Hijazi scheduled my surgery and the cancerous tumor was removed. The next step was several months of radiation, and I was in the clear, or so I thought.

In January 2005 the cancer returned, however in a different form. After several doctors visits I was diagnosed with Paget Disease, a rare form of cancer that attacks the nipple of the breast. It was then I made a life changing decision. On July 18th I underwent a double mastectomy along with a long reconstruction procedure.

I remember being very calm that morning,

After several months of painful injections, my final surgery was scheduled for January 2006 and my ordeal was over. I am cancer free and do not regret the decision I made.

Throughout my journey I had a great support team, starting with my surgeons Dr. Hijazi and Dr. Bormes, who guided me to the end. Of course, first and foremost was my husband Jim, without him I could not have the courage to do what I did.

Since then I am delighted to be able to volunteer at the Northeast Regional Cancer Institute. The wonderful programs and help they provide is priceless.

My journey and battle against cancer has been successful. I want to thank the Northeast Regional Cancer Institute for allowing me to share my story with you.
