

CASUAL Day 2025 Talking Points

About CASUAL Day:

- **CASUAL Day is Thursday, March 27, 2025.** This will be the 22nd year of this awareness campaign.
- CASUAL (Colon Cancer Awareness Saves Unlimited Adult Lives) Day is a program to raise awareness for colon cancer in northeastern Pennsylvania and the importance of screening and early detection.
- The event is in memory of Helen Phillips, a woman who fought a courageous battle against colon cancer and died in the summer of 2002.
- On this day participants dress CASUAL while wearing specially designed hats, socks and custom t-shirts to promote awareness about colon cancer.
- Participants pay \$12 for CASUAL socks, \$10 for CASUAL hats, and \$20 for a long sleeve or short sleeve cotton t-shirt. The ordering deadline is **Friday, March 14, 2025, by 4:00 PM.**
- Individuals interested in getting their whole organization or school involved can become team captains- responsible for ordering & distributing your group's shirts and socks.
- Proceeds support the Cancer Institute colorectal cancer screening awareness, education, and outreach efforts.

About Colorectal Cancer:

- March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month.
- Colon and rectal cancers are the fourth most common cancers in Northeast Pennsylvania with incidence and mortality rates above the U.S. average, 14% and 17% higher, respectively.
- Over 516 new cases are diagnosed, and nearly 200 patients die from colorectal cancer each year in Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Pike, Susquehanna, Wayne, and Wyoming counties combined.
- Most colon cancer is preventable.
